
2/ In Details.

- On May 11, between 01:30 and 01:45 UTC, USCENTCOM successfully engaged and destroyed 3 UAV over the Red Sea. No injuries or damage reported.
- On May 12, at 00:30 UTC, USCENTOCM successfully engaged and destroyed 1 UAV in the GoA. No injuries or damage reported.
- On May 13, between 14:51 UTC and 16:02 UTC, US Warship engaged and destroyed one inbound ASBM launched by Houthi over the Red Sea. USCENTCOM also destroyed one UAS launched by Houthi over the Red Sea.






3/Attack Heat Map















4/Weekly Attack Chart

Most probable scenario - updated on 24 Apr 2024

The Houthis declared an intention to target "Israeli-linked" ships, and they have extended their list of targets to include U.S. and UK-affiliated vessels.

Nevertheless, the number of ships being targeted, with no evidence of a link with any of these countries, underscores the notion that any ship is susceptible to Houthi targeting. Additionally, there are indications that the Houthis might use outdated information regarding ship ownership in certain instances.

Houthis' attack is expected to predominantly involve UAVs and missiles without excluding the use of USVs or even other aerial assets besides UAVs. The attack sequence may commence with a VHF communication instructing the vessel to alter its course towards a harbor under Houthi control. Failure to comply could result in a kinetic assault. The direct boarding attempts, observed in previous instances, has not been observed recently given the robust presence of EUNAVFOR ASPIDES and like- minded European assets. Nevertheless, the presence of skiffs harassing merchant navy ships in the vicinity of Red Sea (RS), Bab el Mandeb (BAM) and Gulf of Aden (GoA) indicates a potential resurgence of the boarding approach.

UAV and missile attacks occur along the primary navigation route off the coast of Yemen, with the highest risk area spanning approximately 200 nm northbound and eastbound of BaM, towards the South Red Sea and GoA accordingly, BAM and GoA, with the latter having the most lethal attacks.

The drop of confirmed attacks in recent weeks in the RS, BAM and GoA shall however not dismiss the fact that Houthis probably still hold the capacity to launch such attacks.

Looking at the wide Indian ocean, the capture of a merchant vessel in the international waters near Hormuz, the fourth of its kind being currently hold hostage, shows that the threat of hijacking is still present in this part of the ocean. Masters and shipping companies are therefore advised to adhere to the recommendations laid out in Best Management Practices (BMP) and below.





Recommendations - updated on 19 Apr 2024

The following recommendations are based on the current situation and may not guarantee success. These suggestions will be updated as necessary.

Ships sailing off the Yemen coast in the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden should consider:

Registering and requesting protection:

- o Register with MSCHOA (Maritime Security Centre Horn of Africa mschoa.org)
- o If planning to ask for close protection, contact MSCHoA watchkeeper and fill the dedicated form

Sailing with additional precautions:

- o Taking into account the risk balance between Safety and Security in accordance with SOLAS Chapter XI-2, Regulation 8:
 - Consider minimizing information in the AIS and LRIT data fields or have them switched off (in accordance with SOLAS Chapter V, Regulation 19 and 19-1), when sailing West of meridian 48E or South of parallel 18N. Around 80% of vessels that have been hit had AIS and/ or LRIT ON.
 - Prefer night transit in the South Red Sea to avoid identification by skiffs or other supporting assets. Consider switching off all unnecessary lights.
 - Alter course and speed. Targeting can be estimated using last course and speed as reported by AIS or other sources.
- Choose routes far from the Yemeni coast (particularly avoiding the traffic separation scheme East of the Hanish Islands) and make a wide detour around the southern islands of the Red Sea.
- o Report anything suspicious (e.g. approaching skiffs, suspicious hailing on VHF, explosions, etc) to postmaster@mschoa.org anonymity of vessel and crew is guaranteed.

Using communication systems with care:

- o Do not use VHF for communications with protecting ships but refer to direct chat systems, e-mails, satellite comms or Interco.
- o Ignore VHF calls and e-mails from 'Yemeni Navy' or 'Humanitarian Operations Command center" and report them to MSCHoA (postmaster@mschoa.org) and UKMTO.
- o Ignore orders / phone calls not coming from protecting ships, as the coordination with other security providers in the area is executed by Aspides authorities.
- o Make sure that the publicly available data on commercially-provided systems e.g. MarineTraffic are updated.

Preparing internal security measures :

- o Consider reviewing security plan with appropriate measures.
- Only essential crew should remain on the navigation deck.
- Crewmembers should stay as far away as possible from the outside walls of the ship.
- Conduct drills onboard prior to approaching Yemen coasts including an SSAS test.





- Utilize random alternation of speed and heading, to evade potential attacks, insofar as safety allows.
- Update and sanitize registered ownership, management and operator data available in vessel-tracking services available to the public.
- o Consider ballasting to submerge engine room areas for protection against impacts and de-ballasting when necessary.
- o In case of close protection any actions conducted by private maritime security companies (ISO 28007 A I: 2015) have to be coordinated with the commanding officer of Aspides asset who has a clearer view of tactical situation.

Reporting in case of incident:

- o In the case of an incident, unmanned vehicles or suspicious activities report all available details to MSCHoA (postmaster@mschoa.org) and UKMTO, with recordings/pictures if possible
- **U.S.-flagged commercial vessels** operating in these areas are advised to remain as far as possible from Yemen's territorial sea without compromising navigational safety. Crewmembers should be especially vigilant when at anchor, operating in restricted maneuvering conditions, or proceeding at slow speeds. Coordinate voyage planning with U.S. Naval Forces Central Command (NAVCENT) Naval Cooperation and Guidance for Shipping (NCAGS) and consider their recommendations and guidance whenever possible. NAVCENT NCAGS stands a 24-hour watch and has the latest information on the current maritime security threats and the operational environment in this region. (According US Marine Advisory 2024-001)
